### **Executive Director's Report**

By statute, the Community Mental Health Act (405 ILCS 20) enables local governments to levy taxes for mental health purposes. The Act outlines the Board's responsibilities, one being the publication of an annual report. The Board embraces its role as the steward of local tax funds and ensures dollars are spent in a responsible manner to address the mental health needs for all residents of St. Clair County.

#### **Summary of Programs & Achievements**

- © Continued to support an array of behavioral health, IDD, and substance use services for residents by contracting with 18 different agencies for a total of \$3.2 million in community funding, an increase of \$200,000 over 2021. Provided over \$125,000 in capital project funds. Added East Side Align as a funded service provider to strengthen the children's mental health system of care.
- Strengthened the Board's role as community mental health authority through planning, systems collaboration, networking, and legislative advocacy.

#### **Significant Accomplishments**

- Provided suicide assessment training & consultation to all area hospital emergency room departments.
- Initiated planning with the community mental health centers and area hospitals to improve admission and discharge practices.
- Reduced administrative expenses by 8%.
- © Continued to provided facilitation for the St. Clair County Suicide and Drug Prevention Alliances.
- Assisted in the implementation of 988 and supports to the crisis continuum of care.

2022 was a very productive year as the Board fully exercised its role as local mental health authority. Key areas to address in 2023 include addressing continued service gaps for persons with mental illness involved in the criminal justice system, implementing new opioid abatement strategies, and positioning the Board for continued success.


